Volunteers pounding home another neighborly Day of Caring

GE Lighting employees have energy to burn on United Way campground project

Thunk.

Slowly, slowly, the heavy rubber mallet bounced off the red patio brick, moving it ever so little as a careful eye checked for level. Less than an eighth of an inch would do it, muttered Juliana Reisman.

Reisman, a 1980 chemistry graduate at Cleveland State University. was far from her profession yesterday as part of a volunteer crew of masons. They were rebuilding a stone-and-brick patio across the back of Amity House at Camp Hilaka/Camp Julia Crowell, a Girl Scout campground.

"I don't do this at home," she told bystanders, each also eyeballing for level.

On hands and knees on the 28-foot by 12-foot span, Reisman sometimes found a crooked brick installed by her colleagues, all engineers, sales representatives and other employees of GE Lighting in Cleveland

The crooked stones were replaced by Reisman and her coworker, A. "Chandra" Chandrasekhar, another GE engineer at Nela Park.

"I'm a perfectionist," said Reisman, partly to soothe the ego of the anonymous crooked-brick layer. "When we checked it with a level, we had to fix it.

About 600 GE employees from several plants in Greater Cleveland participated yesterday in the annual Days of Caring. With many dressed in tattered jeans, white Tshirts and cotton work gloves, the corporate professionals fanned out over the 385-acre campground to

rebuild sheds, install a footbridge, build ramps for disabled campers and tackle a long list of other proj-

After an estimated 5,000 hours of volunteering, the group finished building, painting, roofing and other work that would have cost about \$350,000 if done by contractors, said Les Sipes, chief financial officer of the Girl Scouts Lake Erie Council.

The day was one of seven expected this year as part of an annual United Way campaign in which about 50 corporations allow employees to volunteer for a civic project, said United Way spokeswoman Paula Slimak. About 2.000 people are expected to participate this year, she said.

The projects throughout Greater

Cleveland supplement cash donations by corporations, employees and others, she said. The donor goal for 2002 is \$46 million, with about \$10 million pledged so far, she said.

Reisman, who works on incandescent technology, developing soft lights and other bulbs at Nela Park, seemed to take special care yesterday to balance the color tones among the red bricks.

"Can we get a dark brick here?" she said, lifting a medium-toned brick away from a similar neighbor.

A voice from the crowd shouted, 'We got no more dark bricks.'

With a mild scowl, Reisman said, "We need dark bricks to break up the pattern."
